- * The Chapter's annual Slough Run will be held Saturday, February 28--a 30-mile midwinter dash across Lake Sammamish, down the Sammamish Slough and the length of Lake Washington to Craig and Shannon Magnusson's house, where pizza will be served to the survivors.
- * Wednesday, March 10 the Chapter will have its regular monthly meeting at The Center for Wooden Boats, 6:30 p.m.

YANDT BOATS

My uncle, Robert Yandt, Sr. built boats on the shores of Lake Coeur d'Alene from 1910 to 1967. His son, Robert Yandt, Jr. joined his Dad at the Yandt Boat Works in 1941. Their business was located where the Coeur d'Alene Resort now resides.

They built boats using John L. Hacker designs. Their boats were mostly custom built for individuals or for their own use as taxis boats. Boat rides in these beautiful mahogany boats were a very popular activity in the '40s and '50s. I spent a great deal of my time at the Coeur d'Alene City Beach when I was growing up, and I would watch my cousin Robert, Jr. filling his taxis boat with people at the docks in front of the park. If there was an empty seat when they were ready to depart, I would go along.


My son, Wes, and I have admired wooden boats at shows for years, but we had never owned one. We finally decided it was time to have a Yandt built boat in the family to carry on some family history. We found the "Vouvray" in Seattle. The Vouvray spent its first 20 years on Lake Coeur d'Alene with four different owners. The next 10 years was spent on Lake Washington and Hood Canal with the last 10 years in storage.

It looked very sound when we bought it, and we thought we would be doing mostly refinishing. However, that is not the case.

case. The engine was frozen with the block cracked in three places. And, after the floorboards were removed, we found dry rot on the inner planking and inner chines. With



further inspection, we have found more dry rot at the stem and stern. So, our refinishing job has turned into a rebuild job. We're still hoping for a 2005 launch for the newly named "The Uncle Bob".

WHERE IS ALL THAT WATER COMING FROM?


Last summer, Labor Day weekend to be exact, we were at the Priest Lake Dry Rot Parade and Boat Show in Idaho having a great time with many of our boating friends. All weekend there are fun things to do with the woodies and on Saturday we have the "Poker Run". June and I, with Frank and Barbara Robinson in the rear cockpit, were on our way to pick up our third card in the Poker run. We had started at Dick and Louise Werner's dock, having received our first card along with the detailed instructions for the "Run" from Hutch. We were headed for Cavanaugh Bay at about 26 mph, estimated of course, when all of a sudden the strangest loud noise came from the engine room of Déjà Vu, our '47 CC Custom 20'. I immediately throttled down to idle and Frank raised the hatch covers top see what was causing all the racket. What he saw was the bilge filling up with water at a fairly fast rate and the prop shaft coupler throwing water all over the engine room. Even in neutral the shaft continues to turn somewhat. He yelled at me to make sure the bilge pumps were on and working. June checked the port side (rear pump) and I checked the starboard side (forward pump) and both were streaming water full blast.

The thought crossed my mind that we had struck something submerged that poked a hole in the bottom but I dismissed that right away because we hadn't heard or felt anything that would indicate we had hit something. Meanwhile Frank was busy leaning into the engine room to find the source of the unwanted burst of water into the boat. Eventually he discovered a hose on the out end of the main water pump had uncoupled and we were pumping lake water directly into the boat. In addition there was no water going into the heat exchanger to cool the engine. It was then I noticed the temperature gauge was pegged on hot and I immediately shut off the motor.



In order to get to the loose hose it was necessary to remove the rear seat, all rear seat cushions and the backrest. After squirming into a very awkward position to reconnect the loose hose back into the coupling Frank found that we didn't have the proper screw driver on board.

About that time who should pull up along side? None other than Tom and Margaret in Blackthorn. Of course Tom had the tool we needed and Frank was then able to tighten the double clamps. Loose hose clamps were the whole cause of the problem. Not only had those clamps loosened but nearly all the numerous clamps around the motor were loose to some extent. With a Fresh Water cooling system that is on this boat there are a lot of clamps and most hoses are double clamped.



What I learned from this experience was that you cannot take hose clamps for granted and they should be checked for tightness at least annually. A leaky clamp on a gas line can be fatal for a boat, as all it takes is a spark to ignite a fire and goodbye boat. And in my case a loose clamp on a water line, in fact the hose was double clamped, caused several minutes of real excitement. I am glad to say that all turned out well except for the Poker Run as we came in dead place. And a special thanks to Frank for doing the entire repair work as I sat in the front seat and watched.

Boat Shop Tour

Last December, an invitation from Stephen M. Julius, Chairman and Stephen F. Hess, President, was received from Chris-Craft, urging those who would be in attendance for the quarterly ACBS meeting in Sarasota Florida to attend a plant tour and have lunch in their facilities on January 9, 2004.

Knowing of ACBS's high regard for wooden products, the invitation stated that Chris-Craft had "added cherry and maple cabinetry and flooring to the *Roamer* Motor Yachts and the clean lines of the teak still grace the launch and Corsair models.

The year 2004 marks the 130th Anniversary of Chris-Craft. The company plans to celebrate the anniversary through a series of antique boat shows and rendezvous throughout the United States. (Did you know Christopher Columbus Smith built his first boat at the age of 13.) Further information about this company may be obtained from their website, www.chriscraft.com.

Upon entering the lobby of Chris-Craft, located at 8161 15th Street East, Sarasota, we noticed a wooden Chris-Craft Triple Cockpit on display. Someone confided that Chris-Craft had traded the owner of the triple for a brand new boat. ACBS members were divided into groups of ten persons each for the plant tour. Our guide was Mr. Hesse, the president.

We were introduced to the molds from which the fiberglass sections are produced. We were taken into a laminating room in which fiberglass strips and other adhesives were put together. It takes a 6-step lamination process to make boats seaworthy. We were shown into another section of the plant where the interiors were installed and some of the exterior accessories are added. On one cruiser a router was being used to cut lines into the aft deck. Directly beneath our observation deck a 43' cruiser and a 36' cruiser were being assembled.

Chris-Craft had five cornerstone qualities:

- 1. A unique design language that is beautiful yet functional.
- 2. Power and agility to provide ultimate performance
- 3. The durability and dependability of a boat built to last a lifetime.
- 4. An unwavering commitment to craftsmanship and innovation.
- 5. A heritage that makes every boat an Icon of classic style and timeless elegance.

After a tour of the Chris-Craft plant an invitation was extended to view the boat yard of George Kreissle, also located in Sarasota. To be viewed here was a 1926 Hacker Hydro named "Empty Pockets", a 1929 Century racer named "Thunderbolt", a 1937 Ventnor gold cup racer named "Juno", and a 1937 Hacker Commuter named "Tempo", which is 44' and was owned by band leader Guy Lombardo. The latter boat has had its hull worked on for the last five years and was nearly completed. Several antique race boat engines were also viewed.



Boating Safety



I feel that I have a great job. I have the opportunity to teach boating safety and be involved with all groups of boaters. However I just received the 2003 Preliminary Summary of Fatal Boating Accidents.

In reviewing this information I see cretin words that continue to appear year after year. They are alcohol, capsizing and not warring a life jacket. The age ranges from 27 to 50 with most in the 40's. Each and every one of them went out to have a good on the water. It is sometimes very hard to believe that something a much fun as boating is can turn on you and suddenly you are in a life threatening position.

I continue ask myself what can I do to encourage boaters to take a boating education/safety class. I can here some of you saying "I don't need a boating class I've been boating for years". So OK if you don't want to take a boating class please consider doing some reading. Get out your CHAP-MAN PILOTING Seamanship & Boat Handling book and do some review. Go to the Idaho Department of Parks and Recreation boating education web site and review it. You can find it on www.boatidaho.org.

The U.S. Power Squadron, U.S.C.G. Auxiliary, and Boat US have very good web sites that have tons of great boater education / safety information. Take the time and review these sources. It's still winter and chances are you will not be boating for a couple more weeks. If five of you or more want a boater safety class I'm your guy --- call me and I'll put it together. 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










Map to Jim & Kathie Thorpe's

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The Rodney Dangerfield Of Boating The Boat Trailer

David Crettol, Boating Education Coordinator. Idaho Dept. of Parks and Recreation.

Every year I either see or will always read of the boat that "jumped off its trailer". Because of that I offer this annual safety article about your boat trailer.

For those members that do take care of their boat trailer, THANK YOU, and for those members new to boating take a couple of minutes and read this article PLEASE.

Approximately 80% of all privately owned boats spend 6 months or more on their Trailer. Most boats in Idaho are trailered to and from the recreation waters every time the boat is used. More frequently than not the Boat Trailer is the last item to be made ready for the upcoming boating season.

WHAT ARE SOME OF THE KEY ITEMS TO BE LOOKING FOR ON A BOAT TRAILER?

- Check the owner's manual of your towing vehicle to make sure that your vehicle is rated to tow the combined weight of your boat, motor and trailer.
- If the combined weight of the boat and its engine is 90% of the recommended load capacity, buy the NEXT LARGER TRAILER. (Boat Capacity Plate)
- Check the condition of the TRAILER TONG, COUPLER, WINCH, ROLLERS, and BUNKERS.
- Most importantly, the <u>hitch size must match the size of the ball</u>. The size rating will be stamped on the ball as well as the hitch.
- Keep the trailer **BALL** clean. If you don't have a cover you can clean the ball by using WD-40 and fine steel wool. Clean the ball at least twice a year.
- CHECK THE WHEEL BEARINGS TO INSURE THEY HAVE GREASE.
 IT IS RECOMMEND THAT YOU USE <u>BEARING BUDDY'S</u>.
 (Through a spring like action grease is forced into the bearings)
- Be sure to use only MARINE & INDUSTRIAL CORROSION CONTROL TRAILER BEARING GREASE.
- Check the electrical wiring, lights and connection to insure that Stoplights, Turn indicator lights, and Running lights are in good working order.
- Tongue weight is the weight the loaded trailer places on the towing hitch. The tongue weight should be 7 - 10% of the combined weight of the boat and trailer. (Capacity plate + trailer weight)
- When loading you boat onto the trailer take time to ensure that the boat is evenly on the rollers and bunkers, this will give your boat maximum support.



Now there is a tentative name (Happydaze; sort of complements the 17' utility Goodoldaze) for the 1948 Chris-Craft 30' sedan cruiser that Steve Zwarg and Chris Knapton got me involved with, I've rented a slip for this summer at Blackwell Island, but the parts continue to stack up and the time before summer seems too short. As I've explained to several folks about this project, speed is NOT one of my attributes. But I'm having a good time, and that's the whole point of these rebuild projects for those of us who do not do it for a living.

All the paint is off the hull exterior, and most of the interior. The galley is completely gone to get at the hull behind it. Screws have been tightened or replaced if broken, CPES has been applied liberally everywhere, and some refilling has begun. About 10 keel bolts have been replaced, with 4 more to go. The transom and gas tanks have been replaced. The rear deck is re-installed. All the glass is out and new pieces are here and ready to go back in. Wiring has just begun. The strut and shaft are back in and aligned. The engine is ready except for rebuilding the carburetor and finding a thermostat that fits the American Motors housing someone added sometime. The head is designed and all parts made or bought except for a vanity cabinet.

Still to go are: strip about 8' of the cabin and 6' of the berth interior, cleanup and reinstall the port rub rails, install new glass all around, figure out what to do with the underside of the cabin top and berth deck, replace the water tank and install the water system, replace the top canvas covering, caulk all seams, rewire and relayout the instrument panel, paint the hull and varnish the brightwork, rebuild the entire galley including a new reefer and stove, lay teak on the forward deck, and probably numerous other things I haven't found yet. I hope I can remember where all those parts go that are stored in bags.

If I don't get it all (or at least enough of it) done to use the slip, is there anyone who wants to rent a 32' slip for all or part of the summer? Bob Ickes








