PACIFIC NORTHWEST CHAPTER NEWS By Marty Loken

The Pacific Northwest Chapter recently elected new officers, who will serve two-year terms. Marty Loken is President of the chapter, with Kirk Knapp as Vice President and Membership Chair; Craig Magnusson as Secretary and Joan Knapp as Treasurer. Newly elected to the Board of Directors is Warren Olson, who will serve as co-chair of the 2004 Classic Speedboat Show, along with Dick Kasperson.

Marty indicates he'd like to have more programs "or other entertainments" during club meetings--in addition to covering the business of the chapter. For the November meeting, Philip Borgnes of Maritime Productions, showed a 'rough cut' of the video he shot of last summer's Classic Speedboat Show. (The final version will be made available to ACBS members in another month or so. For details, ask Marty.)

The Pacific Northwest Chapter's January 14 meeting will feature a slide talk on the history and recent restoration of the classic yacht Malibu, which was nearly lost 18 months ago when it went on the rocks in the San Juan Islands. The yacht was fully restored at a cost of \$2.4 million--far more than the insurance company would agree to cover--and was given the chapter's "Restoration of the Year" award for 2003.

The February 11 chapter meeting will be held aboard the historic schooner Zodiac, berthed at the north end of Lake Union. A "schooner dinner" of spaghetti, salad, garlic bread and brownies will be served by the Zodiac's crew.

Saturday, March 20 the chapter will host its annual Shop Tour, this time at the renovated Jensen Motorboat Company on Portage Bay. Jensen is a third-generation company that has built (and rebuilt) hundreds of classic powerboats, launches, hydroplanes and sailboats over the decades. The tour will include a peek at Jensen's recently-organized archives, showcasing almost all of the boats build over the years.

Saturday, May 1 is the annual Opening Day Parade in Seattle. This year's theme will be "The Games of Summer," and the Pacific Northwest Chapter will be out in force, as usual.

Many new on-the-water events are planned by the chapter for 2004, including a big Poker Run on Lake Washington in late June. (Stay tuned...)

The Classic Speedboat Show will be held July 17-18 at South Lake Union Park, in Seattle.


Bob Ickes is working on:


Good Things come in Small Packages by Marty Loken

Hornet 125 to 151 Class step hydroplane

At first we were reluctant to display Restless alongside Hornet, since their side profiles are similar. We decided to go ahead, realizing that the two boats are actually very different.

While basic dimensions are close, Hornet displays a lower profile and racier, more radical underside with its planing step, under-the-bow rudder and transom-mounted shaft strut, extending the prop 12 inches behind Hornet's stern.



Built for the 125 racing class with a 47-horse motor and overall weight of 750 pounds (boat, engine and everything), the designer of Hornet claimed a speed of 40 mph.

Plans and building instructions for Hornet appear in the 1934 book by Edwin Monk, How to Build Wooden Boats, reprinted in 1992 by Dover Publications and still widely available.


FLYER 15-foot step hydroplane

Bruce Crandall, designer

Crandall designed a stunning collection of raceboats for *Motor Boating* magazine, many of them bearing the *Flyer* name, and this 1936 model is our all-time favorite.

At 15"-2" overall, Crandall's 135 Class step hydro is a few inches longer than the other runabouts featured herein--but at speed it's really another 14-footer since *Flyer* has a transom step that shortens on-the-water length.


Flyer is a classic streamliner, designed to carry most of her weight on the foreplane so that a wide afterplane is not necessary. (Good thing, because the planing surface narrows to only 16 inches at the transom!)



If you plan to take a companion out in *Flyer*, be sure they're a *close* friend--this is a small boat with a very cozy cockpit.

The original engine suggested for the 135 cubic-inch class was a Universal *Blue Jacket Racer*, a flathead four. Assuming you don't have a *Blue Jacket Racer* in the basement, you might consider a modern four-cylinder marine engine or, for the ultimate power-to-weight ratio, Rotary Power Marine Corporation's super-compact 175-hp engine, which would produce speeds to match the breathtaking appeal of this little boat.

We may build a few *Flyers* this winter for customers—including a stretched 18-1/2-foot version of the Crandall boat. (If you're curious, get in touch and we'll let you know how they turn out.)



MUCHO GUSTO 14-foot runabout


After showcasing several little boats from the 1930's,



we shift to the early 1950's to review Mucho Gusto, a flashy hot-rod designed around the Crosley four-cylinder inboard, which was used extensively in the 48 cubic-inch three-point hydro class. Stock Crosley engines developed only 25 hp, but could easily be hopped-up to produce about 40 hp, burning normal fuel. These were lightweight little powerplants, turned at about 4,800 rpm. They were fairly simple to acquire and rebuild, so they appealed to many amateur boatbuilders. The basic Crosley later appeared inside the cowl of a Fageol outboard engine. Still later, it was beefed up and used in the Homelite outboard, rated at 55 hp. (We have two of the Crosley-Fageol blocks, and have thought about using one in a boat such as Mucho Gusto.)

The biggest difference between Mucho Gusto and the other pint-sized runabouts is its construction. While the earlier designs feature traditional plankon-frame, Mucho Gusto is built with 1/4-inch marine plywood over sawn frames. She's also several inches beamier than the 1930's boats, with non-trip chines and a beautiful reverse sheer that nearly drops into the water at the stern. Mucho Gusto appeared in Sports Afield magazine's Boatbuilding Annual. We haven't run into the design elsewhere. and certainly haven't seen one of the boats on the water, but it would be a terrific performer and great-looking boat, employing the most compact four-cylinder engine you could come up with...or the rotary powerplant mentioned above. So there you have it--five delightful little runabouts, designed to offer maximum pleasure in minimum packages. Take your pick, and get to work!




