It Is Now Law

The state of Washington now has passed what is called "Boater Safety Education" law. This new law will require that starting on 1 January 2008 boaters will have to have taken an approved boating safety course in order to operate a boat. Now don't panic! Here is how it works. On January 1, 2008 if you are 20 years or younger you will need a Boater Education Card. Here is the break down:

By 1 Jan 2008	20 years & younger
By 1 Jan 2009	25 years & younger
By 1 Jan 2010	30 years & younger
By 1 Jan 2011	35 years & younger
By 1 Jan 2012	40 years & younger
By 1 Jan 2013	50 years & younger
By 1 Jan 2014	60 years & younger
By 1 Jan 2015	70 years & younger

If you are born before 1955 you are GRAND FATHERED IN !!! You won't have to get a Card !!! If you are a licensed caption or licensed boat operator of any type you are home free.

You may take a boating safety course from the U.S. Sail & Power Squadron or the Coast Guard Auxiliary. Once you take this course it is good for life and it is good in all 50 states. As of now 37 states require that you take a boating safety course. The course that the Power Squadron offers is GOOD in all FIFTY STATES. So if you move to Oregon that already has this law, you only need to take your certificate to the state and pay your money and you are good to go.

In Washington, once you have taken the course you will have to wait till the state gets their act together to find out where to go to get your education certificate. (Maybe by the time you read this they may have their act together, I hope so.) It will cost you \$10.00 and will be good for life.

You can go to the state's web site to get more details www.parks.wa.gov/

You can call the "U.S. Sail & Power Squadron" at 1 (888) 367-8777 to find the Squadron that is the closest to where you live. The cost will be about \$40.00, this covers the cost of the books and the classroom training. The teaching is all done by volunteers that are members of the Power Squadron, and have been certified as instructors.

I am sorry that I am unable to give you any information about the Coast Guard Auxiliary as I am not a member, but their goal is very much like the Power Squadron's and that is SAFE BOATING !!!

Visions of Chris Crafts Danced in Our Heads

It was love at first sight. Both with the guy who lead me by the hand through the Chris Craft dealership and this magnificent wooden cruiser we walked toward on the show room floor. I was awe struck. The mahogany finish gleamed under the showroom lights. The finish felt like silk under my fingertips. And peering over the rail, the inside was more elegant than anything I'd ever seen.

In 1956 Newport Bay, California was as full then as it is now of luxurious water craft of all makes sizes and models. But Larry and I were lucky enough to cruise the harbor in the 16 foot wooden boat his dad had bought unfinished and painstakingly made into the boat of his dreams.

That summer every chance we got, that wooden boat was hooked up to Larry's beat up "47" Chevy convertible and hauled to Newport Bay. First we'd water ski then we'd cruise the bay to gawk at the boats and dream of someday owning an elegant wooden pleasure craft. It was one of those summers; we were young, in love and full of dreams. And then reality hit. We got married. Life changed.

A move to Sandpoint, Idaho, five kids and two great Danes later put us at 1974 and a used plastic boat. Again we spent every spare minute water skiing, this time on Lake Pend Oreille. We loved our boat, but it wasn't wood and it wasn't a Chris Craft. A few years passed, we sold the boat and you guessed it. We bought another plastic boat. And it didn't resemble the boat of our dreams.

Then Larry decided to build a wooden boat. Still not a Chris Craft, but it was a woody and had great lines. He carefully cut and fit cedar strips with the help of his dad while the rest of us watched the progress. Finally the time came to pull the staples. Afterward we stood back and admired the canoe lying upside down in its cradle on the sawhorses and imagined paddling down the Pack River in this sleek lined cedar strip canoe. Happy, we covered the boat for the night. How much better could it get? We had a wooden boat of our own.

The next morning Larry rushed outside to check on the canoe. To his horror, during the night the cover had blown off and it had sprinkled. The strips that had been so carefully laid in place had pulled away and were sticking out everywhere at odd angles. Larry got out the box of matches. His dad grabbed them away and figured they could save the boat. Many hours later the boat was patched and looking good again. We toured Pack River many summers in that cance. Larry built two more wooden boats; row boats and they are a pleasure.

One Christmas I bought Larry a book on Chris Crafts, those gorgeous boats we'd dreamed of for so many years. I figured that was as close as we'd get to the real thing. Then one day driving between Coeur d'Alene and Sandpoint, Larry spotted a wooden boat. In fact he drove by it three different times and mentioned the boat a dozen more times before he finally called me on the cell one evening and said he would be right home. We were going to look at a wooden boat that needed restoring. We drove back, bought it and hauled it home in the first snow storm of the year. It's possibly a 1947 Reinell. We finally had a real wooden boat.

But we still longed for that elusive Chris Craft.

Sandpoint finally had their first Wooden Boat Show (2003). You guessed it. Bud Moon had a Chris for sale and we bought it. After all those years of dreaming of a Chris Craft we actually owned one. Our dreams had come true.

But there's still a tiny glitch in that dream. Both wooden boats have yet to be restored. So here we are, 50 years later, still dreaming of cruising Lake Pend Oreille in that Chris Craft on a fine summer day.

May 20th Shop Tour Demo Summaries

I. Vacuum Bagging Workshop (Jim Brown)

"Vacuum bagging" is a technique to apply pressure to large or irregular surfaces not suitable for clamping. This process was used to apply pressure for gluing and curing of 25% of the Sizzler's hull covering at one time! The mahogany boards were glued up and held in place with special staples incorporating "washer heads" that could easily be pulled after full cure. A plastic "bag" was formed using plastic sheeting and a very sticky mastic material pressed between the plastic and the area being cured. With the plastic in place, a vacuum pump was connected to the plastic bag; the vacuum pulled the bag tight against the surface thereby "clamping" it to the main structure. In the demonstration, a loud BANG was heard as the suction began to actually crack the model used. Warning: Do not try to vacuum bag an entire boat; force of the vacuum would likely crush the hull!

II. Resin and Epoxy Workshop (David Koschmitter and Giorgio Cecchinato)

David demonstrated the process of applying West System resins, cloth and filler ma-

terials used for various applications. Highlight of his demonstration was the application of "Peel Ply," a special close-knit material resembling cheesecloth. The Peel Ply is put over the last resin coat and a light coat of resin is applied on top of the Peel Ply. During the curing process, the "amber" coloring in the resin rises to the surface of the Peel Ply. After full cure, the Peel Ply is pulled off, carrying the amber with it and leaving behind a surface that is ready for paint after only minor sanding—a tremendous work saver in coating boat bottoms! Giorgio reviewed several different bonding materials, including very high-strength 2-part epoxy mixtures of significantly different mechanical properties and prices. Readers are encouraged to contact The Resort Boat Shop for details.

III. Surface Finishing (Mitch Devore)

This highly informative session covered staining and final buffing and everything in between! Of particular interest was his discussion of Clear Penetrating Epoxy Sealer (CPES). This material is applied after staining on new work, but can also be applied on top of damaged varnish to significantly reduce visibility of "sun-checking." Thus, application of CPES might be an alternative to full stripping of a damaged finish. Mitch also reviewed use of Epifanes regular and 2-part varnishes. The 2-part variety is about 4 times the cost of regular varnish (\$600/gallon vs. \$165/gallon) but it builds up much more quickly. Mitch also gave us demonstration of applying varnish with foam roller and finishing with foam brush; remember to finish "dry to wet." Best to do this work as a team, one person rolling varnish on and a second person brushing smooth.



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

Mt Dora Antique and Class Festival, March 24-26, 2006

Mariette, Jason and I were invited out to the Mt. Dora Wooden Boat Show in central Florida this past March by Gerald Dake, ACBS Sunnyland Chapter President, and John Ross, former past President. We met Gerald and John at the Flathead Lake Show while they were on a 45day boat show tour of the Northwest last summer. They trailered over 4,500 miles!

The Sunnyland chapter has over 550 members and hopes to surpass the largest boat club (Tahoe) this coming year. The theme for the 19th annual show was focused on Canadian-manufactured Shepard boats. The preparation for the show was impressive and clearly evident as over 140 boats were launched with a whole crew of smartly dressed volunteers using tractors to launch all of the boats and then quickly removing and stowing the trailers off site.

Saturday's opening ceremony featured Ms. Ann Geagan singing God Bless America after which they launched a Russian boat used by the Soviets to retrieve Cosmonauts. Needless to say, a real crowd pleaser. At 10AM there were 14 Amphicars doing their annual parade and "Splash In". On Saturday evening the Victorian 1880s Lakeside Inn hosted a huge lawn party with multiple buffet tables and open bar, then a great Caribbean theme band played till midnight while we all danced like fools and wore ourselves out.

Over 530 people attend this monster bash. Although the weather was cool and windy (for Florida anyway), the local police estimated over 50,000 in attendance for the four day event. A total of 23 states were represented to include boats as far away as Oregon, California and several from Canada.

Mariette, Jason and I also participated in the 5-day St. Johns River Cruise along with 25 other boats. We ate and



drank like kings while taking in the beautiful vistas and the tropical flora and fauna including huge alligators and turtles! We ended up at the beautiful Florida Yacht Club in Jacksonville which was established in 1850 for another round of parties.

Last but not least was the "Vendor Alley" with mountains of old boat and nautical items being hawked throughout the weekend. I could have spent the whole weekend shopping at the Alley.

I can say it was a super time for all and a great way to escape the gloomy late winter weather and get a little suntan. See you there next year???

With our new ACBS affiliation, we will be sponsoring the 2nd Annual Wooden Boat Show on Payette Lake on August 11-13 this summer. We had 22 boats last year without much lead time to organize and put on the show, so we hope to double the number of boats this year. If any of you have an interest in trailing your wood boat over to our show, let us know ASAP as accommodations in McCall are always in short supply in August. Jim Donald is in charge of the boat show this year and he may be reached at 208-362-2840. We would certainly love to attract some outside talent to our show, particularly our neighbors from the Inland Empire! The show will be held at the Mile High Marina starting off with a skippers cocktail party and live music on Friday night and a boat parade on Saturday with a diner and awards banquet on Saturday night where we will auction off the original painting of our boat show poster.


Building Our Chapter's Membership Email List
