Boats on the Boardwalk - 2017 Coeur d'Alene Show



More than fifty classic boats lined the boardwalk at The Resort for the Coeur d'Alene Classic Boat Festival, August 25-27. The show was sponsored by the Inland Empire Chapter of the Antique and Classic Boat Society. The combination of perfect summer weather, clear blue skies, forested mountains framing scenic Lake Coeur d'Alene, and an impressive display of well-shined boats of various types and ages, made for another great boat show. This annual event, held at The Resort throughout the past 25 years, is one of the premier west coast shows, drawing thousands of visitors from Washington, Idaho, Montana, British Columbia and points beyond.

Although the show consisted largely of wood boats, there were other types as well, including the first fiberglass Cobalt, manufactured in 1972. Lake Coeur d'Alene is large enough to support a fleet of cruisers, and there were a number on display, in addition to the familiar runabouts and utilities. A collection of woody station wagons was located on The Resort grounds, which added another popular feature to the show.

Boats ranged from the professional Concourse quality restorations to boats lovingly restored by their owners. Although the show is not a judged event, awards were given for Skippers' Choice and People's Choice. Jim and Cathy Nelson's beautiful 1955 30'Chris Craft Captain, Endless Summer, was the winner of the favorite of the other skippers. The coveted "People's Choice" went to Althea, a 1929 38'Chris Craft Commuting Cruiser.

Special guests of the show were ACBS executive director Dan Gyoerkoe and his lovely wife Tracy, who made their first trip to the area. The Resort, which has hosted several ACBS national shows in the past, has been selected for another international show in 2022. Coeur d'Alene is also the center of contemporary wood boat building

The weekend started with Friday evening's "Welcome Aboard" dinner at the Nordman Restaurant. The venue is filled with northern Idaho charm and memorabilia, plus they serve up a great spaghetti feed. Poker Run Master, Brian Fair warned us to "fuel up your boats for Saturday's Poker Run, because you're gonna need it!" No kidding - we ran almost two tanks of fuel through the Unde Bob. Saturday night, 86 people enjoyed a catered dinner at Dick and Louise Werner's home, and we all had a chance to swap stories of the Poker Run.

Sunday featured the public boat show for several hours at Elkin's Resort, on the west side of the lake. The locals came out in force to view the beautiful boats - the same boats that caused all the chaos on their normally serene lake the day before. With 44 boats on display, the dock hands at the resort had their work cut out for them. Then came my per-

Why do we name our boats what we do? Sometimes the meanings are very deep and well thought out and other times the name is simple and comes easy. Whatever it is and however we came up with it, they are all unique and help to define our boats.

The "Uncle Bob"

As Dad and I were well into the restoration of our 1963 20' Yandt Utility, the subject of what to name it came up on a regular basis. When we got the boat, it was named "Vouvray," which is a white wine not a boat, so we did need a new name. Part of the restoration of this old boat included researching the history of The Yandt Boat Works. My Dad's uncle, Bob Yandt, only had one child. His name was Robert. Robert and his wife Barbra were very involved in the boat works and, in fact, took it over as Uncle Bob aged. Robert and Barbra had two children; however, neither of them wanted anything to do with the old boats, so as Robert and Barbra reached their retirement age, the boat works just kind of dwindled down to nothing.






John was a true gentleman with a big heart and we were fortunate to be his friends! John and Jan Keener

We had been members-at-large of the ACBS for several years before buying our wooden boat. When we joined the local chapter, John was the first person we met. From that point on, our story is probably similar to all other new members who had the pleasure of being taken under John's wing. He was interested in the Shepherd. He was delighted when we won the drawing for a free registration at the Sandpoint show. As the dockmaster, he gave us a prime location with heavy traffic (it was also close to the beer tent). He encouraged us to have the boat judged, so we would understand the differences between historically accurate restorations and the functional changes we had chosen. We had a steep learning curve, but John was always

The Lenhart's Coeur d'Alene Lake place was only about a mile south of our cabin, but it took us a couple of years to coordinate a boat ride with them in the Shepherd. We picked John and Jan up at their dock, he got behind the wheel, and in less than five minutes he had diagnosed a misaligned steering cable - an issue that had plagued us newbies since we bought the boat!


"What's happening in the shop"

We laminated a new transom bow out of 3/16" thick white oak, as part of the new transom framing. This finished up well, so we moved on to the final fairing of the bottom side frames. This took the usual amount of head scratching and procrastination, but in the end, it came out quite well.

We are now starting to work on the keel. We wanted to use white oak but could not find a piece big enough, so the experts at Edensaw Lumber talked us into using purple heart. This wood is dense and very heavy, but so far... so good.

The Colt was only built in 1957 and 1958 for a total production run of around 200 boats. Dick has only been able to locate a couple of these boats still in existence. They are in the middle of doing a 5200 bottom.



Seafaring Words in Everyday Speech

"Shake a leg"....("Come on, hurry up!")

Crews on British warships of old were often denied shore leave when they were in harbor for fear that they would desert. In order to cushion this disappointment, wives and sweethearts were allowed to live on board while the ship remained in port. In the morn-



ing, the boatswain's mate would awaken the crew with the cry "Shake a leg". If the leg that appeared over the edge of the hammock was hairless or had on a stocking, its owner was presumably a woman. The women were permitted to remain in the hammocks while the hairy-leg owners, presumably the sailors, were mustered on deck. The practice of women living aboard British warships was abolished around 1840, but the expression "shake a leg" took on a life of its own ashore, where it still means "Come on, hurry up!"










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
